Dear Friends,

The PCUSA has stepped out on a new venture. It's called the Vital Congregations Initiative. They've chosen fourteen Presbyteries across the country to start creating vital congregations. I just looked up the definition of "vital." Something is vital when it is absolutely important and necessary or essential.

Cascades Presbytery is one of the fourteen presbyteries chosen to participate in this program over the next 3-5 years. I have been asked to serve as one of four facilitators for the program in Cascades. Covenant's session agreed in March to participate in the program as it gets up and running and Linda Ford has been recruited to take the first national training with me in early May in Denver, CO.

So, I've been wondering about vital congregations . . . What would it be like for a congregation to be necessary and important? . . . Necessary and important to who? Their own members or their community? What makes a congregation important or necessary? I'm guessing it has something to do with people whose lives are made better because of the congregation.

Maybe lives are made better because people are fed and clothed and they feel welcomed and important in the life of the congregation. Maybe lives are made better because people feel they in turn can help others. Maybe lives are made better as people experience joy and growth and peace. If that's the case, Covenant already knows what it takes and there's already evidence of vitality within this faithful bunch of folks. Covenant gives much of itself to mission work and to providing vital worship and fellowship.

It's also true that there are people outside the walls of Covenant whose lives could be better. I'm very excited to find out how Covenant and other churches can become more vital in and for their communities. I have a feeling it requires taking the hospitality, welcome, and trust we find within the Body of Christ out into the world. After all, that's what Jesus said the Kingdom would be like.

The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has finished our Mission Information Form (MIF). (Thank you! Well done good and faithful servants!) Our Presbytery Committee on Ministry has approved the MIF and it will now be active on the PCUSA's "dating" website for those minister candidates searching for a new congregation. Our MIF states clearly that one of our future goals is to become more active and vital by partnering with other non-profits in our community in works of compassion and justice. I couldn't be more proud of Covenant.

Special Maundy Thursday Service – Barbara Campbell

On Thursday night, April 18th, Smith Memorial, Savage Memorial and Cherry Park will join us here at Covenant to celebrate the Foot Washing, Last Supper and New Commandment from Jesus to "love one another, just as he has loved his disciples." "Maundy" comes from Old French (mandé), spoken from 1000–1300 C.E. and from the Latin mandatum novum (a new commandment).

We will begin with a shared a soup supper together at 6:00 pm. We need volunteers from Covenant to help provide soup and bread and a few people to help with set up and serving. (See note from Congregational Life)

At 7:00 pm we will begin worship with a time of guiet reflection and music as Maundy Thursday symbols are carried into the sanctuary and placed on the communion table. Those who choose will then participate in a "hand washing" remembrance. We will welcome our special guest Bruce (Baruck) Morris, Cantor from P'nai Or Jewish Renewal Congregation in Portland who will provide special music. Baruck will also recite the Passover prayers in Hebrew during communion and lead us in a Jewish Passover song on his guitar. Scripture readings and hymns from Holy Week texts will also guide us throughout the evening which leads up to Good Friday.


